



The South Okanagan Events Centre is a 5,000-seat multipurpose arena in Penticton, British Columbia, Canada. It is home to the Penticton Vees ice hockey team. The arena opened to the public in September 2008. Previously, the Vees played at Penticton Memorial Arena. The centre hosted the 2018 Scotties Tournament of Hearts Canadian national women's curling championship and the centre is home to the Young Stars Rookie Tournament, which is an annual tournament featuring rookies and prospects from the Calgary Flames, Vancouver Canucks, Winnipeg Jets and Edmonton Oilers. The centre can accommodate up to 6400 individuals for concerts. We will meet in the hotel lobby and can walk to the event centre from there.

Facility Tour - SS Sicamous

The stern wheeler SS Sicamous is a luxury vessel that was used to transport passengers and cargo to remote communities along the shores of Okanagan Lake. The ship was launched in 1914 from the Okanagan Landing Shipyards, at the north of the lake. The Sicamous travelled from Penticton to Okanagan Landing with 14 scheduled stops throughout. Her luxury and beauty attracted crowds at each dock, while travellers experienced elegance in dining and service renowned by Canadian Pacific. Today the ship is preserved on the shore of Okanagan Lake, in Penticton BC. It opened as a museum and heritage site and is cared for by a non-profit organization called the SS Sicamous Marine Heritage Society. The Sicamous is a unique part of Okanagan history and heritage.

Daniel Booy, Altum Engineering Ltd.

This presentation describes the role and responsibilities of a commissioning provider. It emphasizes the pros and cons of retaining a commissioning provider for mechanical system capital projects, with many examples of projects done well and projects that could have gone smoother had the commissioning provider been engaged in an appropriate manner. The lessons learned from over 20 years of engineering design and intense onsite field experience are shared in this succinct summary.

Penticton Community Recreation Centre Emissions Reduction Grant Application David Kassian, City of Penticton

The City of Penticton submitted a grant in May, 2022, to retrofit the Community Recreation Centre for energy and emissions reductions. When implemented, it is estimated the retrofits will reduce Penticton's corporate emissions by 15%, or 300 tC02e annually. To determine the appropriate retrofits, an intensive energy audit was conducted through Fortis BC's Custom Efficiency Program. The findings of the audit provided the foundation to submit the grant, as the audit contained detailed information on the recommended retrofits, costs, emission reductions, ROI, and more. This work is in line with the 2022 Corporate Energy and Emissions Plan, which has a target to reduce emissions by 45% from 2009 levels by 2030.


